## Ukrainian Refugee School Impact Supplement: FY 2023

Dear Colleague Letter 23-06

October 3, 2022

Dear Colleague:

The Additional Ukraine Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2022 (AUSAA) provided the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) specific appropriations to provide benefits and services to support specific Ukrainian populations and other non-Ukrainian individuals, as delineated in [ORR Policy Letter \(PL\) 22-13, \*Ukrainian Humanitarian Parolees Eligible for ORR Benefits and Services\*](#). This Dear Colleague Letter (DCL) outlines the FY 2023 AUSAA allocation to states<sup>1</sup> for Refugee Support Services (RSS) Refugee School Impact (URSI) funding, which totals \$43.4 million.

Description of eligible populations, priorities, service requirements, considerations regarding equity and inclusion, and reporting and monitoring requirements for AUSAA RSS, are included in relevant sections within [ORR PL 22-15, \*Refugee Support Services Funded by the Additional Ukraine Supplemental Appropriations Act\*](#). Additionally, while URSI programming is limited to AUSAA-eligible individuals, its benefits and services are the same as those under traditional RSI, and it is governed by the RSI guidance delineated in [ORR PL 22-07, \*Refugee School Impact Program\*](#).

### Qualification for URSI Allocations

In order for states to receive an FY 2023 URSI allocation, the state must qualify for RSI funding per [ORR DCL 20-12, \*Refugee School Impact Refugee Support Services Set-Aside: FY 2022 Funding\*](#), or have an estimated AUSAA population of 120 or more people in FY 2023.

### Explanation of Allocations and Number of People

ORR used the following data to arrive at the “Number of People” and “Allocation” totals included in the below FY 2023 URSI Allocations Table:

- FY 1991 through FY 2021 historic arrival data for ORR-eligible Ukrainians arriving in the United States from the ORR Refugee Arrivals Data System (RADs); and
- Number of [Uniting for Ukraine](#) Form I-134 sponsor applications filed, by state, according to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

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<sup>1</sup> The term “states” throughout this DCL refers to states and replacement designees (RDs) that receive RSS funding from ORR.

In determining allocations, ORR gave equal weight to the historic and sponsor data. The percentages derived from each state’s proportion of these equally weighted national totals were applied to an estimated 100,000 Ukrainian arrivals in FY 2022 and FY 2023 to determine “Number of People” for each state. The “Allocation” of funding for each state was calculated by applying these same percentages to the total amount of URSI funds available.

### **FY 2023 URSI Allocations**

The chart below documents the “Number of People” and funding allocations for the URSI program for FY 2023. As required under ORR regulation 45 C.F.R. §400.210, these funds must be obligated by September 30, 2024, and must be liquidated by September 30, 2025. All awards are subject to the availability of federal funds.
