

Afghan Refugee Support Services Supplement: FY 2022 Third Allocation: Legal Assistance

Dear Colleague Letter 22-11

Dear Colleague:

The Afghanistan Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2022, and Additional Afghanistan Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2022 (ASA) provided the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) with specific appropriations to provide benefits and services to the citizens or nationals of Afghanistan delineated in ORR Policy Letter (PL) 22-10, Afghan Populations Eligible for ASA-Funded ORR Services. This Dear Colleague Letter (DCL) outlines the third FY 2022 ASA allocation to states¹ for Refugee Support Services (RSS) base funding, which totals \$63 million. This ASA RSS allocation is to specifically fund immigration-related legal assistance for eligible Afghan populations.

For a description of allowable immigration-related legal assistance activities as well as guidance regarding coordination, reporting, and procurement of those activities, see ORR PL 22-11, *Immigration-Related Legal Assistance Allowable Under ORR ASA Funding*. For information regarding general service requirements, considerations regarding equity and inclusion, and other reporting and monitoring requirements for ASA-funded RSS programming, reference the relevant sections within *ORR PL 22-03, Refugee Support Services Funded by the Afghanistan Supplemental Appropriation*.

Funding Formula and Allocations Chart

The FY 2022 Third RSS Base ASA Allocations chart below displays the third allocation of FY 2022 ASA RSS base funding and the "Number of People" used to determine the allocations. To arrive at the "Number of People" totals, ORR used the number of Afghan Placement and Assistance (APA) Program beneficiaries who have departed a Safe Haven to their new communities, as recorded in the Hummingbird database.

States that had fewer than 20 APA arrivals will not receive an allocation.² The formula for future ASA RSS allocations will be adjusted based on updated data, as available. ORR intends to reassess allocations for the remaining funding later in FY 2022.

As required under ORR regulation 45 C.F.R. §400.210, these funds must be obligated by September 30, 2023, and liquidated by September 30, 2024.

¹ The term "states" throughout this DCL refers to states and replacement designees (RDs) that receive RSS funding from ORR.

² Other resources through ORR discretionary grants and other funding mechanisms will be available in areas where ASA-funded RSS legal assistance is not available.
