

# Afghan Youth Mentoring Supplemental: FY 2022

Dear Colleague Letter 22-15 March 31, 2022

# Dear Colleague:

The Afghanistan Supplemental Appropriation Act, 2022, and Additional Afghanistan Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2022 (ASA) provided the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) with appropriations to serve certain citizens or nationals of Afghanistan resettled to the United States. This Dear Colleague Letter (DCL) announces the FY 2022 ASA-funded Afghan Youth Mentoring (AYM) supplement to states<sup>1</sup>, within the Refugee Support Services (RSS) Youth Mentoring (YM) set-aside program, which totals \$13 million. This DCL explains ORR's method of determining the FY 2022 AYM allocations and provides the specific funding amounts for eligible states.

For a description of eligible populations, see <u>ORR Policy Letter(PL) 22-10</u> Afghan Populations Eligible for ASA-Funded ORR Services. While AYM programming is limited to ASA-eligible participants, its benefits and services are the same as those under traditional YM, and it is governed by the YM guidance delineated in <u>ORR PL 22-09</u> Youth Mentoring Program. Therefore, for considerations regarding program goals and services, equity and inclusion, and reporting and monitoring requirements, see ORR PL 22-09.

### Qualification for the FY 2022 AYM Supplement

In order for states to receive the FY 2022 AYM supplement, the state must have received at least 10 ASA-eligible youth (ages 15-24) who departed a Safe Haven to their new communities as recorded in the Hummingbird database through March 1, 2022.

# **FY 2022 AYM Allocations Chart**

The chart below documents the "Number of ASA-Eligible Youth (Ages 15-24)" described above, and the corresponding funding allocations for the FY 2022 AYM supplement. Pursuant to 45 C.F.R. § 400.210(b), states must obligate these funds by September 30, 2023, and liquidate the funds by September 30, 2024.

# **Explanation of Allocations**

ORR allocated the FY 2022 AYM supplement based on the following tiers: 1) a per capita tier for states with 60 or more ASA-eligible youth; and 2) a floor tier for states with 10-59 ASA-eligible youth. ORR further separated the floor tier as follows: states with between 25-59 ASA-eligible youth (\$50,000) and between 10-24 (\$35,000).
